14	MEDAL OF HONOR FOR WORLD WAR I OR WORLD WAR

16	Whoreas have in Anderson County in 1906 Corneral Fraddi
17 18	Whereas, born in Anderson County in 1896, Corporal Freddig Stowers grew up in the Sandy Springs community as the fourth of
19	Wylie and Annie Stowers' ten children; and
20	Wyne and Annie Stowers ten children, and
21	Whereas, with a passion for education, Corporal Stowers' parents
22	made sure that each of their children knew how to read and write
23	even though only the youngest of their children could be spared
24	from farm work to attend school; and
25	
26	Whereas, Corporal Stowers was the beloved husband to Pear
27 28	Stowers, and together they had one daughter, Minnie Lee, before he left for the Army on October 4, 1917; and
29	ne left for the Affiny on October 4, 1917, and
30	Whereas, he was assigned to the all-black 371st Infantry Regiment
31	93rd Division, National Army; and

33	Whereas, within two months, Corporal Stowers was promoted to
34	private first class and by the spring of 1918, he was assigned to the
35	American Expeditionary Force (AEF), sent to France, and
36	promoted to corporal; and
37	Whoreas participating in the autumn AEE compaign in the
38 39	Whereas, participating in the autumn AEF campaign in the Champagne Marne area which led to the Allied breakthrough o
40	the German military line and German surrender six weeks later
41	Corporal Stowers led his squad during some of the bloodies
42	fighting of the war, especially for African American soldiers; and

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1 2 Whereas, facing incredible enemy resistance, Corporal Stowers did not hesitate to take charge and set a courageous example while putting himself in great personal danger, and he inspired his men 5 to follow him in the attack; and 6 Whereas, continuing to press the attack against a determined 7 enemy, Corporal Stowers continued to move forward, even though himself mortally wounded, urging on the members of the squad 10 until he died; and 11 12 Whereas, Corporal Stowers died on September 28, 1918, and was buried in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery in France; and 14 15 Whereas, soon after the war ended, Corporal Stowers was 16 recommended for the Distinguished Service Cross and, in December 1918, his commanding officer upgraded the 17 recommendation to the Medal of Honor although it took nearly seventy-five years for his meritorious service to be properly 20 honored; and 21 22 Whereas, in the mid-1980's, Historian Leroy Ramsey brought to light that no African American had ever received the Medal of Honor for either World War, although some had received it for the 25 Civil War, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War; and 26 27 Whereas, New York Governor Mario Cuomo, New York Congressman DioGuardi, and Texas Congressman Michey Leland took up the cause in 1987; and 29 30 31 Whereas, despite the Pentagon's initial opposition to reviewing possible honorees, they undertook an almost three-year review which lead to the award of only one Medal of Honor which was awarded posthumously to Corporal Stowers in 1991; and 34 35 36 Whereas, presented to Corporal Stowers' surviving family, sisters Mary Bowens of Greenville and Georgiana Palmer of Richmond, California, and great-great nephew, Army Staff Sergeant Douglas Warren, the Medal of Honor is a symbol of Freddie Stowers' service to his country and the exceptional courage he displayed in battle, and he will always be remembered for the ultimate sacrifice he made for his country: and

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1	Whereas, the South Carolina General Assembly is pleased to pause
2	to reflect on the life and military service of Corporal Freddie
3	Stowers who after seven decades finally received the official
4	recognition he so richly deserves and recognizes that he served as a
5	role model, not just for African Americans, but for all Americans.

8	Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate

11	That the members of the General Assembly of the State of South
12	Carolina, by this resolution, commend the extraordinary heroism
13	of Corporal Freddie Stowers and honor him as the first African
14	American to be awarded the Medal of Honor for World War I or
15	World War II.
